## **REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT, CAFE (Lynn Lemisko)**

With the decision by Congress & CSSE to hold a virtual conference again in 2022, the CAFE Executive and Board of Directors continued to work in support of our 2nd VP & Program Chair, Jonathan Anuik, in conference planning and scheduling Special Events of particular interest to CAFE/ ACÉFÉ members. Our 1<sup>st</sup> VP, Jeannie Kerr issued calls for nominations for CAFE- ACÉFÉ awards and she formed adjudication committees to review the nomination packages so that Award Holder could be announced and honoured today. I cannot thank enough the members of the CAFE Executive and Board for contributing their time and energy in discussions of arising issues related to general conference planning (for example, the waving of certain registration fees) and in discussing plans for CAFE Special Events sessions. Amidst all the other 'pandemic challenges' this hard-working CAFE team was unstinting in sharing their time and ideas to these conversations and, as I take up the position of CAFE Past President, I hope you, Jonathan, Jeannie, Sandra, Cynthia, Kurt, Michelle, and Gemma and SIG Presidents - know how very much I appreciate your commitment and support of CAFE. I look forward to our future work together with gratitude.

- CAFE members Drs. Jeannie Kerr and Ee-Seul Yoon will be appointed as CJE English-language editors for a three-year term commencing 1 July 2022.
- I received word that Dr. Kurt Clausen, holder of the 2020 Herbert T. Coutts Distinguished Service Award for Outstanding Service to CSSE, will finally receive a plaque as the tangible acknowledgement of his award.

### **Updates From CSSE Board of Directors [Association Presidents] Meetings)**

In addition to planning for the 2023 CSSE conference, CSSE Associations have been tasked with/invited to contribute to developing cohesive approaches to the Society's conference planning, communications strategies and policy development. During the CSSE BoD meetings (on Monday and Tuesday, May 9 & 10) Associations (and our SIGs) were asked to consider recruiting members (who could be drawn from our membership and/or Executive & Board) to serve on cross-Association working groups to develop:

- Policies - an Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (Accessibility and Decolonization) Policy; a Code of Conduct.
- Communications strategies - it was suggested that the job description for our Communications officer could include providing Association updates to Cam Smith (CSSE communications officer) regarding 'special events, research, and knowledge mobilization opportunities, to be included in newsletters, the website, social media channels throughout the year
- Conference planning – e.g., registration rates for future conferences especially (i) rates as we move back to F2F; (ii) continuing a fee waiver for Black and Indigenous graduate students; (iii) a fee waiver for students who self-identify with equity-deserving groups

### **3.4.3. Report of the 2nd Vice President (Program Chair) (2022)**

#### **Timeslot 14.4**

**May 17, 2022**

#### **Submissions and Peer Review**

I shepherded the proposals through the peer review process. The Canadian Association of Foundations of Education (CAFE) received 11 submissions for papers (10 individual papers and one symposium). This total does not include submissions to the Canadian Philosophy of Education Society (CPES) and the Canadian Association of Sociology of Education (CASE)—these groups handle their own submissions and peer review process. All submissions for the CAFE received a blind peer review from two peer reviewers. We accepted 10 submissions (including the symposium) and rejected one.

The overall success rate for proposals to the CAFE this year was 91%, which is higher than the 71% acceptance rate for the CAFE at its 2021 meeting. I thank those from within and outside of the CAFE who served as peer reviewers.

#### **Program Planning**

The CAFE, CASE, and CPES were allocated 30 sessions by the Canadian Society for the Study of Education (CSSE). The CAFE took three for multi-paper sessions, one for a symposium, and one for a special event, spotlight, and open session on social media and the foundations titled Professionalism, Incivility, and Social Media: Educational Foundations in these Digital Times—Part Two. I scheduled this annual general meeting, AGMs for the CPES and the CASE, and the E. Lisa Panayotidis lecture. Dr. Jackson Pind (Queen's University) won the Panayotidis PhD Award and delivered the Panayotidis Lecture. I would like the following presenters for agreeing to serve as chairs of the multi-paper sessions and the special event: Ee-Seul Yoon, Gemma Porter, Lauren Jervis, Timothy Sibbald, Victoria Handford, and Mark Currie.

#### **The American Educational Research Association's (AERA) 2022 Annual Meeting**

The AERA allocates one session to the CSSE at each of its annual general meetings. The CSSE asks a different association each year to fill this slot. This year, it was the CAFE's turn to present a panel. On Saturday, April 23, 2022, Lynn Lemisko, Marie Battiste, Jonathan Anuik, Denae Bruce, Gemma Porter, Amy Parent, Jeannie Kerr, and Jo-ann Archibald delivered the session Indigenous-Settler Relations in the Canadian Truth and Reconciliation Era: The End of the Beginning.

#### **Congress 2023**

York University in Toronto, Ontario, is hosting Congress 2023. I would like to express my gratitude to the CAFE executive and members, the CSSE staff, the presenters and session chairs, and all volunteers for their assistance with planning for this year's gathering.

1. Biennial conference

The biennial 2020 CHEA/ACHÉ conference that was twice postponed for Covid-19 will take place, face-to-face at the Laurel Point Inn, Victoria, BC from 13-15 October 2022.

We have received a healthy number of proposals and hope to mount a successful conference, circumstances allowing. (The call closes May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2022.)

Further delaying the face-to-face conference, or holding a hybrid conference, could not seriously be considered because of CHEA's contract with the Laurel Point Inn, which we signed before Covid (in 2018). The hotel imposes a penalty on cancellation and on a smaller than agreed to number of registrants staying in the hotel. We must also use the hotel's IT vendor and the costs of a hybrid conference using that vendor are prohibitively high. Financially, CHEA could not bear these penalties.

2. Online symposium

In October 2021, CHEA/ACHÉ held an online symposium for new scholars. Ten new scholars presented their work. New scholars who choose to turn their symposium paper into a presentation for the face-to-face conference in 2022 will have their conference registration costs paid for. UBC has committed funding for this from a bequest from the estate of the late historian of education and UBC professor, J.D. Wilson.

## Canadian Association of Sociology of Education (CASE) President's Report



### Updates re. SIG's Members, 'Thank yous', and 2021 Conference

In 2021, we had about 40 members; as of May 2022, we have 60 members. I was elected as President at the May 2021 AGM meeting. I also served as co-chair of the SIG's conference programming with Alana Butler from Queen's University. I would like to extend a big thanks to Alana, who has been on top of everything and so brilliant and resourceful! Also, she co-chaired our SIG's webinar series, which I will talk more about in the following section on the highlights of SIG's activities. For now, let me also extend my thanks to Pamela Rogers for designing our SIG logo (see above) and to those who worked with her, including Nichole Grant, David Mandzuk, and Jeannie Kerr. We also have a Twitter handle: [https://twitter.com/case\\_acse](https://twitter.com/case_acse). Finally, we had a great turnout for the SIG's invited session at the 2021 conference, titled "The return of Canadian sociology of education? Building a community of scholars to create a new future." This event had some 30 participants with a wide range of expertise, including both emerging and well-established scholars. We will also have a SIG-invited session this year, titled "Contemporary Issues in the Canadian Sociology of Education" (see Session 19.5). I hope you can join us.

### Highlights of SIG's Activities

2021-2022 was the first year our SIG co-hosted a year-long webinar series on Education and Canadian Society with the Canadian Sociological Association's Sociology of Education research cluster. Our objective was to build a supportive community of scholars who draw on the sociology literature to conduct and inform their scholarly work that examines the relationship between education and society in Canada. We hosted five webinars (see the information below for a complete list of webinars and a complete report of attendance and registration). We had 315 registrations and 181 attendants. One key highlight of the webinars was the session with Dr. Karen Robson from McMaster University, who presented her paper on the challenges of obtaining education data when conducting research in Canada. I believe there will be some follow-up advocacy work to collect sociologically-relevant data and make such data more accessible to education researchers, especially in the areas of sociology of education. Lastly, after this year's conference, I will be meeting with the co-organizers to plan activities for the next year.

# **REPORT of the CAFE Nominating Committee**

A number of positions will come up for election at the upcoming Annual General Meeting of CAFE. In accordance with its mandate, this committee searched and solicited to fill these positions. We are happy to report that volunteers came forward to let their names stand for 6 of these 9 positions. We recommend they be placed on the ballot for elections at the 2022 AGM. They are:

**1. President:** Jonathan Anuik

Dr. Anuik has allowed his name to stand for this position. He is an Associate Professor in the Educational Policies Studies Department in the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta. A long standing member of CAFE and its SIG CHEA, he has acted in the very challenging role of Second Vice President (Programme Chair) position for the past few years. Each of these years, a face-to-face conference was supposed to be held in Alberta (2021) and in Montreal (2022), only to have it pivot to an on-line venue.

**2. First Vice President – Chair of Awards:** Sandra Kouritzen

Dr. Kouritzen has allowed her name to stand for this position. She is a Distinguished Professor in the Department of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning of the Faculty of Education at the University of Manitoba. A longstanding member of CAFE, she has held a few positions on the executive committee in the last few years: First as a CJE representative, then as the Secretary-Treasurer since 2019.

**3. Second Vice President – Program Chair:** Jeannie Kerr

Dr. Kerr has allowed her name to stand for this position. She is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Education at the University of Winnipeg. As the number of awards has grown in the past few years, the First Vice-President role has become a more onerous one, and Dr. Kerr has worked tirelessly in carrying out these duties.

## **REPORT of the 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President - Jeannie Kerr**

**May 17, 2022**

The role of the 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President as a member of the Executive is to provide advice and support to the Executive, to the President, and to act as Chair of each of the Awards Committees.

Over the last year, the President and I discussed many issues of interest to CAFE, and I participated in the discussions for planning of CAFE activities with the Executive. It was CAFE's responsibility this year to organize an invited session at the American Educational Research Association on behalf of CSSE. I collaborated on organization of the virtual session with members of the Executive titled "Indigenous Settler Relations in the Canadian Truth and Reconciliation Era: The end of the beginning". The session was chaired by Lynn Lemisko, papers included Jonathan Anuik, Gemma Porter with co-presenter Denae Bruce and I also presented a paper with my co-author Dr. Amy Parent. Calls for nominations for CAFE awards were sent in the fall via an email from the CAFE listserv and posted on the CAFE website. Reminders were sent in December, 2021 and January, 2022. These calls generated significant numbers of submissions which were reviewed by an Awards Committee specific to the award consisting entirely of CAFE members with representation from each of our SIGS. Due to the on-line annual CSSE conference due to COVID, we are announcing the CAFE awards via our on-line AGM and through the listserv, and we have sent the award plaques to the recipients by mail.

**The following are the awards presented on behalf of our Association for 2022:**

### **The E. Lisa Panayotidis Dissertation Award in the Foundations of Education**

Dr. Jackson Pind for his dissertation titled: *Indian Day Schools in Michi Saagig Anishinaabeg Territory, 1899-1978*. Nominated by his supervisor Dr. Theodore Christou at Queen's.

### **Publication Award for Peer-Reviewed Journal Article**

Dr. Lauren Bialystok for her journal article published by *Philosophical Inquiry in Education* in 2020 titled: "Political and Metaphysical: Reflections on Identity, Education, and Justice".
